Eating with the animals

Tropical North Queensland

Breakfast with the birds – Rainforest Habitat - Port Douglas

Enjoy the symphony of sounds and colours from the surrounding wildlife, as you are treated to one of Queensland's best tropical breakfast buffets. Rainforest Habitat is located in the heart of the Wetlands environment in Tropical North Queensland and is a perfect way to start a day of trekking through the nearby Rainforests or Wetlands.

Truly beautiful – The Great Barrier Reef

Come face to face with the wonders of the Great Barrier Reef! Enjoy the majesty of the brightly sculpted coral, while schools of exotic fish swim peacefully by your side. The World Heritage-listed Great Barrier Reef spans more than 2000km of Queensland's coastline.

Where Else but Queensland would you find the world's largest and most complex reef. Most of the reef's 345,000 sq km is protected through the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park.

You can access the Great Barrier Reef from numerous regions in Queensland from Bundaberg, the southern gateway to the Great Barrier Reef heading north via Gladstone, Capricorn, the Whitsundays, Mackay, Townsville, Tropical North Queensland. It is possible to see the reef by air from southern tourism regions such as Brisbane and the Gold Coast for those on a tight touring schedule.

Teeming with wildlife – Mareeba Wetlands - Mareeba

Located an hour's drive from Cairns, the Mareeba Wetlands are a series of 12 inter-connecting lagoons, creeks and channels that weave their way across 5,000 acres. This wetland environment attracts a rich and diverse selection of wildlife, but is best known for freshwater crocodiles and birdlife sanctuary. There are a variety of animal-spotting tours to cater for all ages and interests. With 204 species of birds, over 20 mammal species and a myriad lower vertebrates and arthropods, the reserve is a haven for bird watchers. The Mareeba Wetlands also hosts a fully-guided Whitsunday Crocodile Safari tour on the Proserpine River.

Tropical Birdlife – Hartley's Crocodile Adventures - Hartley's Lagoon, via Cairns

The natural environment of Tropical North Queensland's Hartley's Lagoon is a haven to a wide variety of birds. During the year over 140 species of wild birds can be seen at Hartley's Crocodile Adventures. The lagoon is a great place for bird watchers to spot, among others, kingfishers, egrets, herons and lorikeets.

Whales at play – Hervey Bay

Hervey Bay is known as Australia's whale watching capital. Every year in late July, humpback whales migrate to the warm Hervey Bay waters and remain until November when they return to the southern ocean. Visitors can choose an aerial tour or take one of the many day-long or half day whale watch cruises, which depart from Urangan Boat harbour daily, during the season. Hervey Bay also offers convenient access to World Heritage-listed Fraser Island - the largest sand island in the world, and Lady Elliot Island - the southern-most coral cay on the Great Barrier Reef.

North Stradbroke Island (more commonly known as 'Straddie') is located off the South East Queensland coast amongst the Moreton Bay islands. Close encounters of the dwarf minke-whale kind – Port Douglas

You will be the one satisfying the curiosity of the inquisitive dwarf minke whales! If you are lucky enough to spot them while swimming off the coast of Port Douglas, Tropical North Queensland, the whales will often come right up to those in the water. Poseidon Cruises and Undersea Explorer take you to the whales and are as sensitive as possible to these beautiful marine mammals. No scuba gear and no motors are used during any interactions with minke whales and tours depart daily. Guests swim with them while holding onto a float line and group sizes for this wondrous experience are kept to 10 people maximum. Although encounters are never guaranteed, they are frequent during the winter months.

Crikey! – Australia Zoo - Sunshine Coast

See what world famous Crocodile Hunter Steve Irwin accomplished before his death at Australia Zoo located on the Sunshine Coast. The Animal Planet Crocoseum at the zoo has daily shows which allow visitors to get up-close and personal with some of their most amazing wildlife. Touch snakes as they slither right past your seat, duck as kookaburras, wedge-tailed eagles, owls, and an American macaw swoop and soar right over your head, watch in awe as man-eating crocodiles hunt for food, or watch the tigers feed and play. Australia Zoo also has special up-close interactions with many of Australia's native wildlife including: Tasmanian devils, wombats, echidnas, tortoises, dingos, possums, turtles, cheetahs and tigers. Saving the turtles – Tropical North Queensland

Located 85km north of Weipa on the Western Cape York Peninsula, the small Aboriginal town of Mapoon has developed turtle conservation camps which allow tourists to work alongside local Aboriginal rangers to study and protect turtles. Visitors assist by measuring and tagging turtles, building protection for turtle nests, removing ghost nets and recording data for Queensland's Marine Turtle Conservation Project.

Ever wanted to tag a shark? – Under Sea Explorer - Tropical North Queensland

Shark diving has been taken to new, unusual and exciting levels through Undersea Explorer's researchers capturing sharks underwater during a shark attraction dive (with guests observing). The sharks are brought to the surface for measurement and tagging. This creates a non-frenzied "grey ballet", with great close-up photo opportunities. Up to 25 sharks can be observed while diving, without being inside a cage. The experience is taken to the next level, by the on-deck research after the dive. Little marine miracles – Bundaberg and Gladstone

From November to April, thousands of turtles come ashore the Queensland beaches on their annual pilgrimage to nest. Six to eight weeks later the baby 'hatchlings' emerge from their sandy nests and scurry down to the waters edge. Guided tours operate nightly during the season to allow close up experiences with these ancient mariners. Dolphins in the wild – Tangalooma Wild Dolphin Resort – Tangalooma Island

Each evening the shallow coastal waters at Tangalooma Wild Dolphin Resort (75 minutes cruise from Brisbane across Moreton Bay) become a sanctuary for wild dolphins. Resort guests and Dolphin Care Staff are given the rare opportunity to hand feed these playful creatures and mingle amongst them in the well lit beach waters. In the morning, guests can also head down to the beach to hand feed the resident pelicans and cormorants a bucket or two of fish. Tangalooma Island is also home to dugongs and a migration point for whales

from July to November. The island offers whale watching cruises throughout the season to see these majestic mammals up close.
